The CLEEN Foundation co-sponsored by USIP surveyed in northern Nigeria to determine why young Muslim men join Boko Haram. The three major factors were (1) unemployment and poverty, (2) manipulation by extremist religious leaders, and (3) a lack of awareness of the authentic teachings of Islam. Boko Haram's movement of grassroots anger is attributed to northern Nigeria's continuing deprivation and poverty, and some of the worst maternal and infant mortality rates in the world -- far worse than rest of Nigeria . Many are hopeless, while disengaged from other Nigerians and from decision-making processes. Removing the threat over time requires widespread reforms that provide health and livelihoods of northern Nigerians and includes them in social engagement and political decision-making.

All terrorist groups eventually end. But how do they end? Analyzing 648 different terrorist groups that existed between 1968 and 2006 revealed many ended because they entered, and were included, into the larger community and political process. Military force rarely ends terror groups. The authors recommend ending the use of the phrase "war on terror," since there is no battlefield solution.
